Information for Contributors

Formosan Entomologist is an official journal published by the Taiwan Entomological Society. Since the 35th volume (2015), it has been transformed into an online publication with one volume per year. Contributions are welcome; however, they are limited to those not published in other publications.

All fundamental or applied entomological papers, including original research, short notes, and review articles written in English or traditional Chinese, are favored; however, all taxonomy papers must be written in English. Articles for publication should be written either in English with a Chinese summary or in Chinese with an English summary.

All received manuscripts are promptly acknowledged, and those accepted for publication are published sequentially. A short research report will be regarded as a Scientific Note. The text of a scientific note does not need to be written in the regular format; however, it must include Chinese and English abstracts, keywords, and references and should be indicated when submitting the manuscript.

General Guidelines: Manuscripts must be typewritten on A4 paper $(21 \times 29.7 \text{ cm})$, double-spaced throughout, with ample margins of 2 cm.

Manuscript format, except taxonomy articles written in taxonomy format, other research articles should be written in the following order: (1) Title page, including title, author(s) and affiliation and address, corresponding author email, running title (no more than 10 words), (2) Abstract, about 3% of the entire manuscript in length is advisable, with, no more than 5 keywords, (3) Introduction, (4) Materials and Methods, (5) Results, (6) Discussion, (7) Acknowledgments (If none, can be omitted), (8) References, (6) Chinese abstract (title, author, abstract and keywords), (11) Supplementary information.

The textual description of the content strives to be clear and concise, and the manuscript needs to be numbered with page numbers and line numbers (consecutively, one page after another). The scientific name should be in italics; the full name should be used at the beginning of the sentence, such as *Aphis gossypii*. The metric system is to be used exclusively in manuscripts except where citing label data on type material or in direct quotations when cited as such.

Figure Legends: Tables, figures, and photographs must be on separate sheets. All legends and captions must also be numbered and typewritten on separate sheets. Illustrations should not exceed 14×20 cm (plates used for classification are not subject to this limitation), and the resolution should be at least 300 dpi. The original image files must be sent together when the author submits the manuscript. Improperly prepared illustrations will be returned to the author for correction before acceptance of the manuscript.

Reference citations: the author uses the surname, the year uses AD, and the arrangement order is based on chronological order. For example, one author: (Wu, 1993); two authors: (Jander and Jander, 1970) or Jander and Jander (1970); more than three authors: (Koeniger *et al.*, 1988) or Koeniger *et al.* (1988). Multiple papers with the same author: (Koeniger *et al.*, 1988a, b) or Koeniger *et al.* (1988a, b), (Koeniger *et al.*, 1988, 1989) or Koeniger *et al.* (1988, 1989).

References: Arrange alphabetically by last name. Articles published by the same author are listed chronologically; when the first author is the same, sort by the number of authors. When citing uncommon journals, the full name must be included. When citing non-English articles, the language must be indicated at the end of the reference, for example, **Yao MC, Lo KC.** 1992. Insect species and population densities in stored japonica rice in Taiwan. Chinese J Entomol 12: 161-169. (in Chinese)

All authors are expected to refer to the "Council of Biology Editors Style Manual" (American Institute of Biological Sciences, 3900 Wisconsin Ave., Wash., D.C. 20016) to prepare manuscripts. Examples are as follows:

Abbreviations for titles of journals should follow the list of *Biological Abstracts*. All citations in the text must be listed in chronological order.

Contribution to taxonomic papers: Except for the Results section, which is written in the following format, the rest are by the "General Guideline".

- 1. Manuscripts must be in English.
- 2. Taxonomic name heading:

The name above generic level must be in *bold-faced* capital letters; the generic name must be in small italic letters, except the first letter should be capitalized; specific and subspecific names are small italic letters. The new taxonomic category and new synonym should be stated as: comb. n., com. rev., nom. n., sp. n., stat. n., stat. rev., syn. n. etc., all in boldface, for example:

Family BRACONIDAE

Genus Allobracon Gahan, gen. n.

Allobracon pilosipes (Ashmead)

3. Synonymous listing

Authors are asked to follow the example listed below:

Musca Linnaeus, 1758: Syst. Nat. (ed. 10th) 1: 589

Type species: Musca domestica Linnaeus, 1958, Syst. Nat. 1: 589.

Musca pattoni Austen, 1910: Ann. Mag. Nat. Hist. 5: 115;

4. Description paragraph:

The description of a taxon must be a short, clear, and unambiguous sentence; articles such as a. an or the are not necessary.

- 5. Materials examined:
 - i) Holotype and Paratype(s) must be designated if a new taxon is published. Allotype is not necessary.
 - ii) Collecting site, number of specimens examined, sex, date, collector, host, specimens deposited, and specimen number assigned should be stated in such order. For example:

Material examined: Holotype



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If a new taxon is described, it must have a relationship with other distinguished related taxa to be compared and/or easily recognized characters.

6. Figures:

Drawing or photographic figures must be clearly described, and the scale of each figure must be accompanied. To prepare a good figure, the figure must be boldly drawn in black water-proof ink and in equal space.

7. Registion with ZooBank (The manuscript must be registered in ZooBank before it is published):

"Formosan Entomologist" is an electronic publication. To follow the International Commission on Zoological Nomenclature (ICZN) and make new scientific names and nomenclatural acts available, authors must register the work in ZooBank before publication. LSID number is obtained after registration and then added to the manuscript. The authors need to change this work's status in ZooBank after publication (from "Accepted" to "Published").

Proofreading: The author is responsible for proofreading the manuscript before it is printed, and the author shall bear the cost of excessive revisions. The editor of this journal will not check the proof of the final manuscript for typographical errors, so the author of each paper must be responsible for the correctness of the content of the proof.

Reprints: Once a manuscript is accepted for publication, the author will receive an electronic file (PDF) of the article; this journal does not provide paper reprints.

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
